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Upper Primary Update

This fortnight, Lizzie Lizard delivered another challenge card and resources in classroom mailboxes. She has asked students "How can we use recyclable materials so that Lizzie can visit Wally on the other side of the Werribee River?". This has led to student exploration of sinking and floating and the durability of different materials in water. They have also predicted and then trialled a series of experiments using the same materials to observe the impact of weight, damage (eg: holes) and shape of their vessels.

Predict, Observe and Explain are the key concepts driving this Inquiry learning. Some examples of how teachers plan for, and assess, students' demonstrations of understandings of the following are;

Predict: responding to yes or no questions, using prior experiences to pose questions, making an educated guess at to what might happen.


Observe: using senses to gather information, manipulating materials through hands on experiences, watching others model tasks, taking photos and notes.

Explain: labelling photographs, indicating a preference, using AAC and speech to explain what happened and why, linking back to the prediction and its accuracy.

We are so amazed how our young scientists made their science toy innovations during the Science Week. Their inventions sparkled joy and excitement to learn about movement, push, pull and forces. We are grateful to all parents who sent their photos and videos of them playing and exploring with their children and enjoying the toys they made.

Over the last weeks, we had been exploring the science concepts- push and pull and we had seen a lot of our students learning how they can change the directions of objects around them by applying these forces. Using various tactile and sensory objects, our young scientists are able to understand that they can use their fine and gross motor skills to move objects.

We celebrated Book Week and all our students were thrilled in making their movie trailers about the book they had chosen. They are the main characters of the book trailers they made and we are all collecting them into our Book Flix Page. We are sharing these movies with you all on Seesaw.

Our PPC explorers enjoyed the time in the sensory garden creating the scene of the book "The Very Hungry Caterpillar". They created their own caterpillars using an old stocking filled with potting mix. They planted herbs and flowers that goes to our Sensory Garden.

Our mathematicians learned about less and more to measure how much their containers have. Our mathematicians compared how their different containers had more or less by counting the objects they placed inside. They also used the weighing scale to test which containers will weigh more or less. Great job everyone!

Next week, we are celebrating the Literacy and Numeracy Week. We are inviting all our parents to visit our classrooms next Friday, 1st of September from 2:15 to explore some reading and counting activities with your children. We are excited to show all of you the great reading and counting skills our learners achieved over the last eight months.

Designated Transport Zone Update

Warringa Park School (All Campuses) DTA is changing in 2024. This is due to the opening of a new Specialist School (Mild to Profound Intellectual Disability) opening in Werribee/Manor Lakes called Nganboo Borron Specialist School. Students who have been enrolled at Warringa Park School before 2024 will be able to continue to access the School bus services until the student graduates/leave the school/moves house. If this is applicable to you and your family, your child is able to remain at Warringa Park School and continue to access these bus services. Designated Transport Area changes What is changing?

Nganboo Borron will be opening in 2024. The school caters for students with mild to profound intellectual disability.

The Designated Transport Area (DTA) of abutting schools who cater for students with the same disabilities will have a change in their DTA from the 2024 school year.

What does this mean for existing students accessing a transport service?

All students who are currently eligible for and receiving transport assistance will be grandfathered. This means they will continue to have access to transport assistance.

If an existing student moves residential address or changes school, they will be required to re-apply for transport assistance and will be assessed under the new DTA.

New enrolments in 2024 will be assessed based on the new DTAs.

What does this mean for transport arrangements?


There are no changes to transport arrangements for students who are currently accessing transport assistance. These students will continue to be accommodated for the remainder of their education at their enrolled school. This will only change if the student moves residential address or is enrolled at a different school.


New students who enrol in 2024 will be assessed based on the new DTA.

MOVEMENT BREAKS

Movement breaks can support students to be ready to learn no matter what state they are in.

It can support your child's sensory needs and allows the body to regulate.

These are purposeful opportunities with a clear start and end point to help stay in a regulated state (as not to become overstimulated).

They can be as short as 30 seconds and as long as 10 minutes.
