Wellbeing update

Welcome to December!

I cannot believe we are in December already! The year has only gotten better with student's engaging not only teaching and learning but actively enjoying opportunities to explore and participate in making meaningful social connections that Warringa Park School has to offer.

Choir and Music

Cayley's Road Campus this term ran two polit programs, one for VPC and the other for flexible learning cohort. This was a joint venture between Warringa Park School and Dynamic Performers Australia.

VPC Choir: This program encouraged students to use their voices and give them confidence to sing in a group situation. They focused on dynamics, storytelling, stability of sound and building confidence using popular songs and exercises. They learned via repetition and call and response techniques to build a fun repertoire of pieces and we will add hand and arm gestures (wordography) to help facilitate lyric memorising.

After only 6 weeks there was noticeable changes in the student's confidence self-esteem and social connection. The students performed two of their songs at the Cayley's night market despite nerves and anxiety around performing the student produced what could only be describes as fabulous performance. Flexible learning students: The Music movement program saw students learning how to stretch their bodies so they can move them safely. Basic movements like learning how to cross our midline, working with opposite hands and feet, adding steps together to create routines and repeating these movements to help with memory and confidence. Our students learnt how to listen to the music to feel where the beat needs to sit.

Throughout the sessions it was positive to see more engagement from the students and progress in their ability to move to and connection to the music.

Given the success of our two pilot programs we are hoping to roll out further performing art program across the campuses in 2024.

A big shout out to Cassandra and Caroline from Dynamic Performers Australia who creativity and energy made the sessions so enjoyable for the students.



Wellbeing update

International Day of Persons with a Disability

This week we have celebrated International Day for people with disabilities at all campuses. We know that our students are capable of reaching their potential and are amazingly talented. It has been a pleasure watching our student's grow and build upon what they already know, say, and do. To celebrate the student's participated in Disco, Petting Zoo, BBQ, and face painting across campuses and fun was had by all.

RESTRAINT AND SECLUSION

The following information about physical restraint and seclusion is for all students attending Victorian government schools.

The use of physical restraint and seclusion must only be used in an emergency. This means that staff cannot plan to use them, and they cannot be written into Behaviour Support Plans or Safety Plans.

School staff can only use physical restraint and seclusion to protect a student from hurting themselves or to stop a student hurting another person and there is no other way of keeping them safe. School staff must stop physical restraint and seclusion as soon as the danger has stopped. If a student is secluded, then staff must watch them the whole time.



Restraint and Seclusion Policy information for parents/carers

The following information about physical restraint and seclusion is for parents/carers of students attending Victorian government schools.

Overview

- All students have the right to be safe at school.
- . The rights of students are protected by laws and policies.
- School staff have a duty of care to their students.
- School staff have the right to work in safe environments.
- The law allows school staff to stop a student from doing things that are dangerous.
- Differences in laws and policies can sometimes mean that schools cannot do the same things that families can do at home.

Advice

What are physical restraint and seclusion

The Department defines physical restraint as the use of physical force to stop a student moving.

If a staff member holds part of a student's body, and the student cannot move away, this would be physical restraint. If a staff member blocks a student's movement, but the student can move away from the staff member, this would not be physical restraint.

The Department defines seclusion as leaving a student alone in a room or area from which they are not allowed to leave. Special seclusion rooms or other areas of a school that were built for seclusion, or that are used for seclusion, are not allowed in schools. Schools must not prevent students from leaving areas of the school normally used by students.

If multiple students are left in a room or area this does not meet the definition of seclusion. Sending a student from a classroom, suspending, or expelling a student is not seclusion.

The use of physical restraint and seclusion in schools

School staff are only permitted to use physical restraint and seclusion when they need to protect someone because a student is about to hurt themselves or another person and there is no other way of keeping them safe. These situations are considered emergencies.

School staff must stop physical restraint and seclusion as soon as the danger has stopped.

If a student is secluded, then staff must watch them the whole time.

No one – not doctors, health specialists, or you as parents/carers or your child – can ask school staff to use physical restraint or seclusion.

Physical restraint and seclusion must not be included in a student's Behaviour Support Plan, Safety Plan, Individual Education Plan, or any document about a student's learning or safety.




