Curriculum update

Dear Families.

It has been such a great experience being on the panel for our school review over the past few weeks. The review has provided the Leadership Team with the opportunity to reflect on our school's practices and to discuss how they can be improved and refined. After observing lessons across all campuses, the review panel was extremely impressed by the teaching and learning practices implemented. The panel notes that in all classrooms the Non-Negotiables of Teaching and Learning were evident and that being implemented in a consistent manner across the school. These non-negotiables provide the foundation for all the learning programs we implement, and staff agree that it ensures that students are provided with the supports that they require to experience success at school.

The panel were also impressed by the implementation of the Comprehensive Literacy for All approach to literacy. From their observations as well as staff feedback they have confirmed that the approach is extremely well suited to our cohort of students and that all staff have a great understanding of the strategies that they can use with students with different learning needs in literacy. It has been very rewarding to hear that the work that has been undertaken is ensuring such positive learning outcomes for our students and we are so proud of our staff and students for their hard work and dedication.

I know that the entire Leadership Team is looking forward to our final day of the review when we will spend time discussing the ways in which we can strengthen and improve our practices. The panel has already begun to discuss the ways that assessment can be used to ensure that we are keeping close track of all the learning that students are undertaking on a daily basis at school.

Allied Health update

SHARED READING LET'S BE INTERACTIVE!

Focus on interaction

The focus of shared reading is the **interaction!**Making it an **enjoyable** experience!

What book do I use?

The best books for shared reading are those that you child engages with and enjoys. For example, for a child that loves songs may like a book that is based on songs, a child that likes tickles may like a tickling book. Trying a range of books can help you figure out the sorts of books your child most enjoy.

Don't forget to use your child's AAC communication system!

FAQ

My child is not looking...

Not looking may not always mean "not paying attention". Presume competence and continue to try to make the experience enjoyable. They might still be listening.

My child keeps moving away...

This could be a unfamiliar experience for them. Try following them while using a short and fun book (e.g. where there may be actions or sounds you can incorporate).

How to build interaction? - Share the AIR

As you read the book, stop and chat. You can talk about the words or the pictures. If your child likes a picture, then that is a good place to stop and talk. You might comment that you like the picture too – or that you think it is funny. If the story is making them laugh talk about why it is funny. Stop and chat a few times while reading the book. When you stop and chat, you can Share the AIR:

Attention getter = get your child's attention

 This can be done by exaggerating movements, sounds, facial expressions related to the book (e.g. Wow!, Oh no!, Uh-oh!) and then making a comment/statement (e.g. the bear likes pie!).

Invite to participate = invite your child's participation

 Invite participation with a second comment or with an open-ended question or with a simple yes/no question, using both speech and AAC.

Respond = respond

This is your child responding, or you, the adult, modelling how to respond. If your child does not
respond, attribute meaning to their body language, focial expression and vocalisations. Let them
know what you are attributing meaning to (e.g. you're smiling, I think you mean yes). If it isn't
possible to attribute meaning, then model a response yourself (e.g. I think...). And don't forget to
use their AAC system in this step too!


